- Unsolicited manuscripts and photographs are welcome, provided they are original, with appropriate publication rights from all sources.
- Articles are reviewed for relevance, accuracy & syntax
- Electronic images should be submitted in either .jpeg or .tiff, minimum 4" x 6" at 300dpi with captions and credits.
- All submissions will be given serious consideration, however there is no guarantee that unsolicited submissions will be published.
- You grant AFA First North American Rights and subsequent Non-exclusive Rights for use in online and in other printed and electronic media produced by AFA.



- Manuscripts and photos cannot be returned or acknowledged unless accompanied by a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

The goal of AFA is to insure long-term, self-sustaining populations of exotic birds both in captivity and in the wild.



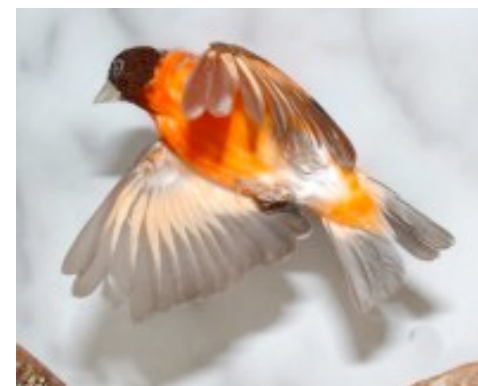
About the AFA ...
